



This discussion guide is designed for parents, teachers, librarians, and booksellers to explore the story's ideas, themes, and meaning with young readers.

THEMES FOR DISCUSSION PEER PRESSURE, INDEPENDENT THINKING

Questions to Ask Before You Read

- What do you do when all of your friends are doing one thing, but you want to do something else?
- Is it hard or easy to be different from your friends? Why?

Questions to Ask After You Read

- The lemmings in the story all want to be the same. If one of them does something, the rest of them follow. Do people ever act like that? When?
- What are some words you would use to describe Larry? Do you think it was easy or difficult for Larry to be so different from the other lemmings?
- How did Larry convince his friends to think for themselves?
- Can you think of a time you were different from your friends? How did that feel?
- What are peers? What do you think the phrase "peer pressure" means? How can peers pressure each other?
- What are some ways you can learn to resist peer pressure, especially if the things your friends are doing don't feel right to you?

Activity

At the top of a blank sheet of paper, write a sentence that tells how you are different from your friends. Under the sentence, draw a picture of what makes you so unique.
